CY 2017 Statistical Summary of Citizen Complaints/Internal Investigations

During calendar 2017 a total of eleven individual citizen complaints were lodged against the Keene Police Department or its individual members. These eleven complaints comprised thirteen categories due to some being multiple complaints on one Officer. All were resolved at the supervisory level. There was one internal investigation initiated during CY 2017.

The breakdown of citizen complaints, by category, is as follows.

The highest number of complaints made is for Unprofessional Conduct (UPC). This category has consistently been the highest for as long as we have been analyzing this data; this category of complaint covers a wide spectrum. As we looked at the complaints made in this category, there was no pattern identified that would indicate ongoing misconduct or lack of training.

One Use of Force complaint exonerated the Officer and the other was unfounded.

Each complaint received was reviewed and the actions noted above were taken as a means to educate and/or train officers. We strive to field professional, well trained Officers and the actions taken are consistent with this effort. Each circumstance was unique and consequently no deficiencies in policy, protocol, or training were identified as a result of these reviews.
